EXTREMELY HIGH RATE OF ABANDONMENT AND VACANT PROPERTY... CRITICAL ISSUE IS AFFORDABILITY, AND THE LACK OF ADEQUATE RESOURCES FOR HOME CONSTRUCTION, REHABILITATION OF VACANT HOMES, AND MAINTENANCE OF EXISTING HOMES.....





OVERCROWDING IS A COMMON OCCURRENCE, WITH REPORTS OF AS MANY AS TWENTY TWO PEOPLE LIVING IN A THREE BEDROOM HOUSE – AN ISSUE THAT IS USUALLY ADDRESSED ONLY WITH NEIGHBOR COMPLAINTS, OR WHEN A TRAGEDY OCCURS. A NUMBER OF ARSONS HAVE LEFT MORE STRUCTURES VACANT, AND IN SOME CASES HAVE SET OCCUPIED HOMES ON FIRE......

FACTS -14621

It's a large neighborhood in the northeast quadrant of Rochester. It is primarily contained within the boundaries listed above with the exception of a long tendril that runs along the Genesee River all the way to Lake Ontario.

This part contains Seneca Park, known for its spectacular Genesee River gorge, as well as the Seneca Park Zoo. Another attraction is the El Camino Trail, popular with bicyclists and known for its beautiful Wall\Therapy murals. Conkey Cruisers, a neighborhood bicycling program, hosts a ride here during the summer.


African-Americans, Hispanics, Asians, and Eastern Europeans make this one of the most ethnically diverse neighborhoods in Rochester.

The area around Hudson & Norton (down to at least Avenue D, and north to Rt. 104) was known as "Polish Town" and was home to waves of mostly Eastern European immigrants. Polish were most prominent, but Ukrainian and Lithuanian were also present.



Street Art and graffiti are inextricably entwined with and contributing factors for broken windows, societal disarray, economic and moral decay of the aforementioned cities, but in this area you can find the most creative graffiti displays covering walls which shows the creative side of the residents.





MORE ABOUT 14621:

The rich heritage of Rochester's 19th century immigrants is still present in Group 14621, particularly along a stretch of Hudson Avenue known affectionately as Polish Town. Here, St. Stanislaus Kostka Church draws hundreds each year to its annual Polish Arts festival. This Romanesque Revival Church, dedicated in 1909, received the Landmark Society's Special Achievement Award in 2004 for restoration on the interior and 120 foot bell tower.

Other historic landmarks remain in the area. On St. Paul Street, the Rochester School for The Deaf, founded in 1876, maintains a scenic campus. Old Carthage, the city's earliest settlement and river port in the 1880's, was located a few blocks north.

Food and specialty stores reflect that rich mixture. Shoppers can find Asian groceries and Caribbean delis along with neighborhood classics.






ON THE WESTERN EDGE, LIES OLD CARTHAGE, THE AREA'S EARLIEST SETTLEMENT. TWO CENTURIES AGO, THE BUSTLING RIVER PORT AT THE LOWER FALLS OF THE GENESEE RIVALED ITS VILLAGE SISTER TO THE SOUTH: ROCHESTERVILLE. EAST OF CARTHAGE IS POLISH TOWN. NAMED AFTER THE WAVES OF POLISH IMMIGRANTS WHO BEGAN TO SETTLE THE AREA IN 1880S.THEY BUILT STREETS OF STURDY WORKMAN'S COTTAGES AND IN 1907 COMPLETED THE LAVISH ST. STANISLAUS CHURCH. TODAY THE CHURCH'S NEWLY RENOVATED 102-FOOT SPIRE TOWERS MAJESTICALLY OVER HUDSON AVENUE. ON THE EASTERN EDGE OF THE DISTRICT, ST. ANDREWS PARISH ALSO TRACES ITS ROOTS TO IMMIGRANTS, THIS TIME FROM GERMANY.


NORTHSIDE CHURCH OF CHRIST


